Fr. Marc to Take Long Overdue Sabbatical

Fr. Marc Boisvert arrived in Haiti on January 1st 1998 and a great story of hope (Espwa) was underway. In his 15th year



providing care and education to orphaned and abandoned children, it's time to take a long overdue and well-deserved break. Father Marc told us, "This is something I've been putting off for a number of years. But this past year, I felt that God has put it on my heart to spend more time getting as close as possible to Him. I'm going to re-commit to

my priesthood and to my ministries in Haiti. I plan to attend a Missionary Studies program in the U.S. to better understand ways to serve the poor. For almost 15 years I've been Papa to so many. Often I'm the one they come to for answers. I'm looking forward to being the one with the questions. I hope to gain a fresh perspective and a renewed promise to do God's work in Haiti. I plan to re-emerge from this sabbatical a spiritually stronger and wiser father and leader to my Espwa family."

Since this is a first for Fr. Marc, the staffs at Hope Village (Espwa) and Free the Kids were a little worried about what the absence of their patriarch/founder might mean. Fr. Marc assured us, "I have done a very good job of making myself dispensable. There are several

good people at Espwa who run things when I travel. They have proven their capabilities time and again." Fr. Marc will miss his regularly scheduled visits to see his



friends and supporters in the U.S. Initially there was some concern that this might hurt summer fundraising efforts. Fr. Marc had these words of wisdom for staff: "TRUST. I learned in Haiti that God will provide."

Husband Wife Doctor Team Serve Espwa Since 2003



The Mutty's granddaughter, Carolyn, attended a recent clinic with her mom, Monique Mutty Brown, a kindergarten teacher

Drs. Larry and Danielle Mutty from Castine, Maine retired from their professional practices in 1999. "Larry was interested in medical missions," explained Danielle, his wife of 52 years. This led to their participation in medical missions in the Dominican Republic, Haiti and Ecuador. The Muttys, who are members of a parish once served by Fr. Marc, knew about Espwa. They decided to pay Fr. Marc a visit and see if they could help. "At that time, the children were mostly in La

Madonne," recalled Danielle. "I remember thinking how small that place was for 250 children. Fr. Marc had recently acquired the farm land and

there were just two small huts on the property." The Muttys have seen a tremendous amount of progress over their many trips to bring vaccines, cancer screening tests and medicines to Haitians. They bring a grandchild each time they travel to Haiti. All but one have made the trip. "We think it's a good experience for them."

Danielle Mutty sings praises for the Pennsylvania vaccine manufacturer Sanofi Pasteur. "They have provided vaccines for every visit since 2006." The Muttys' most recent trip in February brought 305 Meningococcal Meningitis vaccines to the children at Espwa. Danielle has also arranged for Dahl Chase Pathology in Bangor, Maine to provide diagnostic cancer

screening tests for the house mothers at Espwa. "These tests are not widely available in Haiti and Fr. Marc could never afford them. The clinic nurse, Rose, has been trained to do them and Dahl Chase reads the results free of charge. Several potential cancers have been detected and avoided with surgery." Thanks to the Muttys for their dedication to the Espwa family.

Medical Clinic Construction Completed

Over the past several years, thousands have passed through the doors of *Klinik Espwa*, which opened in 2007 to serve the comprehensive

medical needs of the children in our care at Hope Village. Medical treatment is also offered to the students who attend our schools and to Espwa staff and their families. An outreach program provides much needed treatment to the hundreds of neighbors who live in the surrounding villages. These patients are asked to pay a small fee of 125 gourds, about the equivalent of \$2.50, though patients are never turned away if they cannot pay. The staff at Klink Espwa consists of a Haitian physician, two registered nurses and some assistants. They treat an array of illnesses, conditions and diseases including pneumonia, intestinal parasites, infections, diabetes, and hypertension. Some of the more serious medical ailments include malaria and typhoid fever. And of course, there is a steady stream of resident children with lacerations and broken bones.

As you can see from the photo on the upper left, this small two room clinic is inadequate for the many medical services provided at Espwa. For this reason, we have spent several years raising funds and planning the construction of a larger, more functional clinic.

Thanks to the generosity and commitment of Susan Midgett, the

Asante Foundation, the Gerard Health Foundation and Roy & Susie Dorrance, the construction of the new clinic is complete. Thanks to IMEC, the clinic should be fully outfitted and adequately supplied in time for the opening ceremony on Friday, June 15th.

The new clinic contains several exam rooms, a surgical suite, an infirmary

vision and dental treatment. Our new clinic will allow these visiting physicians to be more effective during their visits. For the first time ever, Espwa will have a permanent space to store our dental units for our semi annual dental clinics.

The new Klinik Espwa will provide improved services in the areas of medical prevention, care and treatment to our

where children can stay overnight, and a space for public health education. There will be a radiology room for x-rays, a lab and a pharmacy.

Periodically, medical professionals visit and provide expert diagnosis and treatment in a variety of specialized areas. Visiting medical teams offer surgical, children and those who rely on our outreach programs. The clinic's 24/7 operation will provide more efficient treatment and reduce hospital and ambulance expenses. We are thrilled about the many benefits this clinic will bring to our medical programs. Thanks to all who have made it possible.

IMEC Medical Supplies Enroute to Espwa

Last fall we had a tremendous matching opportunity through IMEC (International Medical Collaborative of America). For every \$10 you donated, IMEC matched it with \$90 in goods for our new clinic. The outpouring of generosity resulted in the speedy outfitting of the clinic. The medical equipment and supplies were loaded on the truck (pictured right) March 14th and are expected at Espwa prior to the clinic opening in June. Thanks to you and IMEC, the new Klinik Espwa will have the supplies and equipment necessary to provide improved medical treatment to the children and families of the Espwa Communities.

April 2012 promises to be an exciting, hope-filled month for donors to Domes for the World. Andrew South, President of DFTW said that's when a significant shipment will be leaving for Haiti.

Thanks to the generosity and efforts of some wonderful organizations, a new girls' village is under construction.

These dome houses are attrac-

tive because they are inexpensive to build and they stay cool in the warm weather. The new girls' village will consist of 7—20 foot dome houses and 2—32 foot domes; one for showers and modern toilets and the other for recreation.

The dome homes, known as EcoShells, are economical because they use less than 50% of the rebar and concrete as a rec-

tangular building with the same square footage. They also take less time to construct. EcoShells use readily available environmentally friendly materials so trees and other

local, natural resources are conserved. Construction can be done by hiring local labor with very little special skills and or equipment. Thanks to Domes for the World and Haiti Youth Relief Fund, our dome village will be a wonderful place for the little ladies of Espwa.

Espwa Kitchen & Dining Room Project

"It never ceases to amaze me how the staff at Espwa can serve as many as 3,500 meals a day from such humble cooking quarters," commented a visitor to Hope Village. "It's like the miracle of the fishes and the loaves everyday!" Up until now the children have dined standing up in the arched building. But soon, thanks to a group of very generous people, we will finally have a kitchen and dining area adequate for the volume of meals served at Espwa.

This 13,000 square foot facility will be large enough for 800

children to eat at one time. One day, hopefully soon, every single child will be able to eat while seated in a chair. This will be a huge improvement.

The structure, which is the largest and most secure of its kind on the Espwa campus, will double as a meeting place for large groups. It was built to withstand natural disasters such as hurricanes and earthquakes. The building is located deep within the property for maximum



security. Fr. Marc will eventuallycelebrate Mass there. It will also be used as a multi purpose hall. The

kitchen, which takes up about a quarter of the total space, is



Under Construction Nov. 2011 designed to increase efficiency. There is plenty of space for food preparers to work simultaneously. And the entire facility will stay dry in rainy weather. "It's better all the way around," explains lack Reynolds, of Free the Kids. "The kitchen will be more sanitary, the food prep more efficient and the storage better protected from the elements. We will benefit by reducing waste." Hopefully this project will be completed in August.






Photo Left: Kitchen end view near well tower for water access

Meet Julio. His family is from Port au Prince. Julio and his siblings were home alone when a catastrophic earthquake with a magnitude of 7.0 devastated Haiti. In the aftermath, there was no word on the whereabouts of Julio's parents. Their home was destroyed, they lost all their belongings and it seemed to Julio and his siblings that they lost their parents too. Some neighbors stepped in to help for a few days before an aunt sent for them and brought

them to Espwa. A few weeks later, Julio's parents were reunited with their children at Espwa. They are now attempting to rebuild the life they once had while their children remain in the care of Vilaj Espwa (Hope Village).

Now more than two years later, Julio is a very talented dancer and singer despite being one of the youngest on the Espwa dance team. Julio has graced Haiti's national television with his big, bright smile and fancy footwork.
